What's New in 2009

- On-line (internet) entries (refer to entry form in center of book) are again encouraged. 67% of entries were submitted online last year.
- All livestock must now be on the fairgrounds by 5pm on July 20, 2009.
- All animals (except rabbits and poultry) **MUST** have a Health Certificate. This is to be obtained no more than 30 days prior to the fair. Upon arriving, health certificates **MUST** be turned in to the Jr. Fair office **BEFORE** animal(s) is/are unloaded at the fairgrounds.
- All Market Turkeys must weigh a minimum of 20 lbs.
- All market livestock (except rabbits and poultry) must be properly castrated prior to tag-in. If not properly castrated prior to tag-in, they will not be tagged in.
- Sale steers – All breeds shown by weight. All steers must be dehorned and properly castrated prior to November tag-in. If not properly castrated prior to tag-in, they will not be tagged in.
- Dry cows cannot be shown in milking classes. (Dairy)
- Jr. Fair Exhibitors may do topline on his/her own animal(s), but no artificial hair may be used. (Dairy)
- Deleted old horse rule stating, "All equine must be vaccinated for West Nile Virus within 180 days of the closing date of the fair. Signed veterinarian certificate required."
- Modified horse show schedule and classes.
- No barn decorations are to be removed until animals are dismissed.
- ALL Jr. Fair Beef Livestock & Dairy Beef Feeders are required to have neck ropes.
- Cheese cow pictures will be taken after hog pictures are completed.
- Horse entries must now include the classes that the exhibitor wishes to participate in. Late fee will be charged to add/change classes after the entry deadline on June 13, 2009.
- Exhibitors are reminded to send thank-you notes to their buyers.

JUNIOR FAIR GENERAL RULES

1. Entries open to any girl or boy between the ages of nine and nineteen years of age as of January 1, 2009 in any school district in Carroll County, who is a member of, or enrolled in 4-H, Vocational-Agriculture, Vocational Home Economics, Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, or other youth organizations.
2. All projects must be entered by the deadline date of the in 2nd Saturday June. Projects cannot be shown or sold without an entry. **Any entries made after the 2nd Sunday of June, will be charged a \$25 late fee, per animal or still project, payable to Carroll Co. Jr. Fair. Late entries will only be accepted on the conditions that a pen/stall is available AND that the exhibitor realizes that they will not be penned/stalled with their club. No late entries will be accepted after the 2nd Saturday in July.**
3. All projects exhibited in Jr. Fair Booths must be in place in the exhibit hall by 9:00 pm Monday, July 20. Exhibits may be placed in booths beginning on Sunday, July 19. All exhibits must be removed by 12:00 noon, Monday, July 27. All livestock exhibits must be in place according to the following schedule:
 - Livestock is to be stalled upon arriving at the fairgrounds. The fair veterinarian will walk through the barns, checking health certificates.
 - Livestock will be dismissed as follows on Sunday, July 26: 4:00 pm - Jr. Fair Market Livestock dismissed; 7:00 pm-All other livestock dismissed.
 - Early removal of livestock or projects will result in loss of premiums.
4. All exhibits must contain the specified amounts and be made in accordance with the exhibit requirements for the project.
5. No exhibit can be shown under more than one name.
6. Exhibitors of the Junior Fair may enter the open classes by conforming to the rules of the open class. Junior Fair members who wish to show in the open class must submit their entries to the Secretary of the Senior Fair Board in accordance with the open show rules and deadlines. No entry fee will be charged in Junior Fair.
7. The Junior Fair is under the jurisdiction of the Junior Fair Committee and the Senior Fair Board. All rules and regulations pertaining to the general conduct of the Senior Fair apply to the junior exhibitors. The Junior Fair Committee and the Senior Fair Board will decide any situation not covered in these rules. Their decision is final.
8. All livestock exhibited at the Fair must meet the health requirements established by the Ohio Department of Agriculture. These rules are outlined in this book under the health regulations section of the General Rules. This also includes regulations passed during the printing of this book. It is the responsibility of the members for testing the livestock in accordance with health regulations.
9. Junior members will not be permitted to stay in the barns at night. The 4-H Office shall be notified by the 4-H Clubs or Advisors of all watch persons scheduled for night monitor of the Jr. Fair Livestock Barns the week of the Fair, by the June 4-H Committee Meetings.
10. All decorative material must be fireproof.
11. A judge's decision is final. All other concerns must be referred in writing to the grievance committee or the horse show steward.
12. All commercial farm displays in Junior Fair are limited to overhead space only, i.e. No booths or displays.
13. The board will take every precaution in its power for the safe preservation of stock and articles on exhibition; this includes Jr. Fair exhibitors, after their arrival and arrangement on the ground, but will not be responsible for any damages that might occur. Exhibitors are requested to give attention to their articles at the close of the fair and to attend to their removal.
14. Exhibitors are expected to conduct themselves in an orderly and courteous manner. Harassment, profanity, or unsportsmanlike conduct toward fair officials, judges, show manager, help or exhibitors will not be tolerated. Violators will be dismissed from the show, asked to leave, and may forfeit all premiums and awards.
15. All protests and grievances must use the following procedures:
 - (A.) It must be submitted in writing to the Junior Fair office within 24 hours of the action or class being protested.

- (B.) Decisions on protests and grievances will be decided upon by a committee made up of one Jr. Fair Board member, 5-7 special committee members, and a Senior Fair board member.
 - (C.) All decisions of the committee are final.
 - (D.) Written decisions may be picked up at the Junior Fair Office.
16. Exhibitor dress during all shows, classes and sales shall be neat, clean and respectable. Dresses or shirts must have at least 2 inch straps, not altered. No shorts, tube tops, halter tops, sunglasses or hats. (Exception: Hats permitted in horse classes.)
 17. No Sr. Fairboard picnic tables or benches are to be placed in barns. Clubs are permitted one picnic table and one bench per club if space is available. This is on a first come first serve basis, and must be provided by the club.
 18. Noncompliance with any Junior Fair rule may result in forfeiture of all premiums and awards.
 19. Any unclaimed junior fair awards will be forfeited 30 days after the conclusion of the fair.
 20. **All Animals (except rabbits and poultry) MUST have a Health Certificate. This is to be obtained no more than 30 days prior to the fair. Upon arriving, health certificates are to be turned in to the Jr. Fair office before animal(s) is/are unloaded at the fairgrounds.**

AGRICULTURAL EXHIBITS

1. All animals must be shown by the Jr. Fair member who owns them, unless physically impaired; otherwise, another Carroll County Jr. Fair exhibitor must show the animal.
2. All livestock exhibits must be in the complete possession and must be in the possession by May 15th for all animals, except: steers (fall tag-in) and dairy beef feeders (March 14). Poultry meat pen must be ordered through the Extension Office. Ownership and possession is lost if the animal has been consigned or sold through an auction or other type of transaction even if the exhibitor “buys back” the animal. If the exhibitor houses the animal away from their home, their advisor should be informed of the whereabouts of the animal. The animal must be housed with the perimeter of the school districts which are eligible to participate at the Carroll County Fair.
3. Jr. Fair families (immediate) will tag-in animals as a “family” animal. Each family is limited to tagging in four animals per exhibitor, with two being for market and two being for carcass. Market animals will be identified to the respective exhibitor at the county fair weigh-in.
4. The registered animals must be registered in the name of the Jr. Fair member or in partnership with a parent, or in the family or farm name.
5. Each exhibitor of livestock is responsible for the care and feeding of their animals and the upkeep of pens at all times. Failure to do so will result in forfeiture of all premiums and awards.
6. Pens must be cleaned by 9:00 am daily. Following the fair, pens must be cleaned by 12:00 noon on Monday, July 27. Small animals by 7:00 p.m. on Sunday, July 26. Premiums and awards will be forfeited if pens are not cleaned daily or after the fair.
7. No cleaning of pens between 4 – 6:00 pm on Sunday, July 26.
8. No barn decorations are to be removed until animals are dismissed.
9. Exhibitors are responsible for contacting the veterinarian of their choice to have their animals tested before the fair. **Exhibitors will be assigned barn space by the Jr. Fair officials. These assignments may not be switched. Violators will have premiums and awards forfeited.** When feasible, Jr. Fair officials may assign exhibitor’s Jr. Fair livestock to barn areas where their family’s open entries are housed, except market livestock. All market livestock must be housed in their assigned Junior Fair area. Only animals to be shown in a Junior Fair class are permitted to be housed in the Junior Fair Barns.
10. No premium money will be awarded to Jr. Fair members unless all Jr. Fair requirements are met. No premiums will be awarded to FFA members unless the project book is currently up to date.
11. All exhibits must be from the 4-H, FCCLA, Boy/Girl Scout project or the FFA member’s farming program.
12. Unruly animals that cannot be shown by the owner are not eligible for the Market or Carcass Classes or Sale.
13. Jr. Fair exhibitors shall not display “For Sale” signs on pens or stalls.

14. Tampering and/or misrepresentation as to breeding, age, ownership and any other irregularity in showing will be considered fraud and deception. Any premiums, trophies, awards or sale money won by such exhibitor will be withheld. Any artificial means of removing or remedying the physical characteristics or confirmation of animals, such as lifting and filling, use of sting, artificial heels, etc., will be considered fraud and deception. The use of artificial tail head or altering the natural color of any animal shall be considered fraud and deception. No coloring may be used. All animals giving evidence of such treatment shall be dismissed from the competition. Should fraud or deception be discovered after the animal(s) has been shown and prior to the sale, such animals(s) shall not be permitted to sell.
 - (A.) The animals placing next in line shall move up.
 - (B.) Should violation be discovered after the sale, all sale money shall be returned to the buyer, and the animal or carcass returned to the exhibitor. In all animal classes, these regulations will be in full force and effect.
15. If any exhibitors, parents or other parties suspect or have information about any type of rule infractions, it should be brought to the attention of any of the Jr. Fair officials. When such infractions are discovered, they will be investigated and a ruling will be made by a grievance committee when appropriate.
16. Individuals and/or families found to violate rules concerning fraud and deception may be barred from showing for a period of one year from showing the species in question.
17. Animals tagged for identification purposes must arrive at fair weigh-in with original tags in the ears. The Extension Office must be notified immediately if ear tags are lost or become separated from the animals before arrival at the fair.
18. Animals not meeting minimal weight requirements may enter fair classes, but are not eligible for championship classes, and cannot sell.
19. Jr. Fair members should enroll in market livestock projects in order to learn responsibility of caring for animals, proper feed and care practices, good management practices, accurate record keeping, and to learn by doing. NOTE: Professional grooming is strictly prohibited on the fairgrounds for all market animals. For breeding project animals, professional grooming is prohibited if the animals are to be shown in the Junior Fair classes, and is prohibited within 24 hours of the Junior Show if the animal is to be shown in open classes. In other words, animals can be groomed by a professional for open classes but not for junior classes.
 - (A) Assistance to exhibitor:
 - a. A junior livestock show exhibitor shall be responsible for the continuous care, grooming, and preparation of the livestock entered in the junior livestock show.
 - b. An exhibitor may receive assistance in the care, grooming, and preparation of the livestock entered in the junior livestock show, provided that the assistance shall be limited to explanation or demonstration provided by the following:
 - (1) Family members;
 - (2) Permanent household members;
 - (3) 4-H or FFA advisors in the exhibitor's club or county;
 - (4) County extension educators;
 - (5) Department representatives;
 - (6) Veterinarians;
 - (7) Carroll County Jr. Fair members of a 4-H club, FFA chapter, or other youth organizations;
 - (B) Those found in violation will not be permitted to show, and may be dismissed from the fair.
20. The market hog show will be a terminal show, all market hogs brought on the fairgrounds must be slaughtered immediately following the fair. This includes underweight hogs and other hogs not sold in the Fair Livestock Sale. If you have an underweight hog or other hog not sold in the fair sale, you must sign an affidavit attesting that your particular hog will be sold for slaughter immediately after the fair.
21. Breeding gilts will not be housed on the fairgrounds, and will be judged via videotape.
22. No common watering tubs/trough will be permitted.

23. Market Animals – If there is a non-qualifying weight, the weigh master must be notified immediately that the member wishes to reweigh and the animal will be reweighed at the discretion of the weigh master only once.
24. Only show officials are permitted in the show ring during classes.
25. All market livestock (except rabbits and poultry) must be properly castrated prior to tag-in. If not properly castrated prior to tag-in, they will not be tagged in.
26. All Animals MUST have a Health Certificate. This is to be obtained no more than 30 days prior to the fair. Upon arriving, animals are to be stalled, at which time the veterinarian will come to you for the health certificate.

NOTE: Chapter 901-19 Ohio's Livestock tampering Exhibition Rules will be made available to a livestock exhibitor or adult advisor, upon request.

CODE OF PRACTICES

The following describes general responsibilities of the farmer and all persons in their authority, in the proper care and handling of animals raised for food and fiber.

- To provide food, water and care necessary to protect the health and welfare of my animals.
- To provide a safe and healthy environment for my animals that is clean, well ventilated and provides ample space.
- To provide a well planned disease prevention program to protect the health of my herd or flock. This includes a strong veterinarian/client relationship.
- To use humane and sanitary methods when it becomes necessary to dispose of my animals.
- To make timely inspections of all animals to evaluate the health and insure that all basic requirements are being met.
- To insure proper handling techniques are used to eliminate any undue stress or injury when manual manipulation is necessary.
- To provide transportation for my animals that avoids undue stress or injury caused by overcrowding, excessive time in transit or improper handling when loading or unloading.
- The willful mistreatment of my animals or the mistreatment of any animal will not be tolerated. In cases of mistreatment, I will notify the proper authorities.
- To make management decisions based on scientific fact and to consider the welfare of my animals.
- We encourage livestock producers to complete species-specific quality assurance programs.

JUNIOR FAIR LARGE ANIMAL LIVESTOCK SALE RULES

1. Sale of cheese, steers, market hogs, dairy beef feeder calves, & market lambs and will be held on Friday, July 24, 2009 at 6:00 pm in the Metal Barn..
2. An exhibitor and their project sale item (live project animals only) must remain in the sale ring at all times.
3. All Junior Fair exhibitors of steers, market lambs, market hogs, cheese, and dairy beef feeders are eligible to sell their animals providing the following qualifications are met:
 - (A) The animals must be shown in their market classes.
 - (B) **All market hogs must weigh a minimum of 200 lbs.**
 - (C) **All market lambs must weigh a minimum of 90 lbs.**
 - (D) **All market steers must weigh a minimum of 900 lbs.**
 - (E) **Dairy feeders must weigh between 400 – 750 lbs.**
 - (F) Junior Fair exhibitor may sell a maximum of 3 products (including champions) limited to 1 per species (1 steer, 1 lamb, 1 hog, 1 cheese, 1 dairy beef feeder, 1 market goat, 1 meat pen of rabbits, 1 Market turkey and 1 pen of Broilers) at the Junior Fair Livestock Sales (only 2 in large animal or cheese sale). Grand and Reserve animals are not required to sell, but Large Animal Grand and Reserve projects **must go to slaughter** according to the State Rule 901-19-02. If an exhibitor shows both the Grand and Reserve Champion in a species, both of these animals may sell.

4. All steers will be weighed on Monday, July 20 at 5:00 pm.
5. All dairy beef feeders will be weighed on Monday, July 20, immediately following steers at approximately 7:00 pm.
6. All market hogs will be weighed on Monday, July 20 at 5:00 pm.
7. All market lambs will be weighed on Monday, July 20 in the Small Animal Barn (only if scale meets standards, if not, they will be weighed after hogs in Hog/Lamb Barn)
8. The order of sale for each species will be determined as follows:
 - (A) Grand Champion and Reserve Champion animals will be sold first and second regardless of weight class.
 - (B) Following champions, remaining animals will be sold based on class placing.
9. Auctioneers will not read any letters from exhibitors during the sale.
10. Thank-you baskets are not to be given to sale clerks for distribution to buyers.
11. Animals are to be paid for at the conclusion of the sale.
12. Animals sold will be released to the buyer on Sunday, July 26 at 4:00 pm. Animals will not be released to the buyer unless proper payment has been made. Buyer must show proof of purchase at time of pickup.
13. Exhibitors must feed and care for all market livestock until 4:00 pm on Sunday July 26th. After 4:00 pm, the animal becomes the property and liability of the buyer, if payment has been made, with the exception of failing carcass inspection.
14. Members will be held responsible for any carcass condemned due to drug residues.
15. The purpose of the market animal project is for the animal to go to slaughter for human consumption, not for the member to take home as a pet.
16. Sale commission on animals is 2%.
17. Exhibitors who show 2 animals of the same species MUST let the Junior Fair Office know by 10:00 pm on the day of show, which particular animal will sell in the sale, or neither animal will sell. Exhibitor must also state where the 2nd animal is to be taken by 10:00 pm on the day of show, or the 2nd animal will be hauled to the Sale Barn with monies mailed to owner. With the exception of hogs, this will be 10:00 am, Wednesday morning.

JUNIOR FAIR SMALL ANIMAL LIVESTOCK SALE RULES

1. Sale of market chickens, market turkeys, market goats, & market rabbits will be held on Saturday, July 25 at 1:30 pm in the Metal Barn.
2. An exhibitor and their project sale item (live project animals only) must remain in the sale ring at all times.
3. All Junior Fair exhibitors of market goats, meat pens of poultry, and rabbits are eligible to sell their animal providing the following qualifications are met:
 - (A.) The animal must be shown in their market class
 - (B.) Each meat pen of rabbits must weigh between 3 ½ and 5 lbs.**
 - (C.) Market turkeys must weigh a minimum of 20 lbs.**
 - (D.) All market goats must weigh between 50-135 lbs.**
 - (E.) At the large and small animal sales, no Junior Fair exhibitor may sell more than 1 market hog, 1 steer, 1 market lamb, 1 dairy beef feeder, 1 cheese lot, 1 market goat, 1 meat pen of rabbits, 1 Market Turkey, and 1 pen of Broilers). If an exhibitor shows both the grand and the reserve champion in a species, both of these animals may sell. Jr. Fair exhibitors may sell a maximum of 3 products (including champions) in the Jr. Fair livestock sales – only 2 of these in the Small Animal Sale.
4. All market goats will be weighed on Monday, July 20 after lambs.
5. All meat pen rabbits will be weighed on Monday, July 20 at 5:00 pm, once. If there is a non-qualifying weight, the weigh master must be notified immediately and the animals will be reweighed at the discretion of the weigh master, only once.
6. All market turkeys will be banded and weighed on Monday, July 20 following market lambs and market goats.
7. The order of sale for each species will be determined as follows:
 - (A) Grand Champion and Reserve Champion animals will be sold first, second, regardless of weight.

- (B) Following champions, remaining animals will be sold based on class placing.
8. Auctioneers will not read any letters from exhibitors during the sale.
 9. Thank-you baskets are not to be given to sale clerks for distribution to buyers.
 10. Animals are to be paid for at the conclusion of the sale.
 11. Animals sold will be released to the buyer on Sunday, July 26 at 4:00 pm if payment has been made. Buyer must show proof of purchase at time of pickup.
 12. Exhibitors must feed and care for all market livestock until 4:00 pm Sunday July 26. After 4:00 pm, the animal becomes the property and liability of the buyer, with the exception of failing carcass inspection, provided the animal has been slaughtered within 24 hours of the release time and payment has been made.
 13. Members will be held responsible for any carcass condemned due to drug residues.
 14. The purpose of the market animal project is for the animal to go to slaughter for human consumption, not for the member to take home as a pet.
 15. Sale commission on animals is 2%.
 16. Exhibitors who show 2 animals of the same species MUST let the Junior Fair Office know by 10:00 pm on the day of show, which particular animal will sell in the sale or neither animal will sell.
 17. Market rabbit and poultry exhibitors are responsible for pick up of fair project and delivery to their buyer. **The 2009 day and time are yet to be determined at the time of printing this book. Further details will be made available once known.** Failure to do so will result in a delivery fee of \$15.00 per project unless prior arrangements are made. The forfeited money will be donated to the Sale Committee.

2009 STATE OF OHIO FAIR HEALTH REGULATIONS

The following are regulations concerning health requirements of livestock exhibited at all Ohio fairs and livestock exhibitions. Health papers are required for most species this year. Pay close attention to which requirements you must meet for your livestock, and be sure to have veterinarian work completed according to the prescribed time period. **If you have questions regarding regulations, contact your veterinarian, or the Carroll County Fair Veterinarian, Dr. Tina Costarella 330-679-2406.** County specific health rules are listed in that respective Department.

Exhibitors

- (A) No person shall present for exhibition or exhibit an animal which he knows or has reason to suspect is affected with or has been exposed to a dangerously contagious or infectious disease or residue.
- (B) The owner or bailee of an animal with symptoms of an infectious or contagious disease shall, when directed by an exhibition official, the approved veterinarian, or an employee of the Ohio department of agriculture, immediately remove the animal from the exhibition premises.
- (C) Upon request, each person who presents for exhibition or exhibits an animal, shall make available any certificate of veterinary inspection, registration certificates, vaccination certificate, and other documents to exhibition officials, the approved veterinarian or an employee of the Ohio department of agriculture.
- (D) Each person who presents for exhibition or exhibits an animal for which a certificate of veterinary inspection is required by rules 901:1-18-01 to 901:1-18-11 of the Administrative Code shall forward a copy of the certificate of veterinary inspection to the Ohio department of agriculture's division of animal industry.

Swine

NOTE: Market Hogs do not require a Pseudorabies Test for the Carroll County Fair in 2008.

- (A) Swine moved within Ohio for exhibition:
 - (1) At a terminal show must:
 - (a) Show no symptoms or evidence of an infectious or contagious disease; and

- (b) Originate from a county which sixty days prior to the exhibition opening date had no pseudorabies quarantined herds; and
 - (c) Have no breeding swine present and all swine removed are delivered for immediate slaughter or to a licensed livestock facility.
 - (d) Notwithstanding any other provisions of these rules, the manager or sponsor of the exhibition may, prior to permitting the exhibition of any porcine animal at a terminal show require proof, for example a VS form 4-33, animal disease diagnostic laboratory submission form, or a certificate of veterinary inspection, the animal has been tested and classed “negative” to an official test for pseudorabies within forty-five days immediately preceding the opening date of the exhibition.
 - (2) At all other shows, must be accompanied by a certificate of veterinary inspection issued within forty-five days preceding the exhibition opening date; and Must be negative to an official pseudorabies test within forty-five days of the exhibition opening date unless:
 - (a) They originate immediately and directly from a pseudorabies qualified herd; or
 - (b) Are suckling pigs accompanying a negative dam; or
 - (c) They originate from a pseudorabies vaccinated herd and meet the following conditions:
 - i. The herd has had a negative monitored test within twelve months, and
 - ii. The swine presented for show are negative to a pseudorabies differential test; or
 - (3) Will be exempt from the requirement of a certificate of veterinary inspection if they originate immediately and directly from a stage V area and show no symptoms or evidence of an infectious or contagious disease.
 - (4) Are exempted by a written permit issued by the department.
- (B) Swine imported into Ohio for exhibition:
 - (1) Must be accompanied by a certificate of veterinary inspection issued within thirty days preceding the exhibition opening date; and
 - (2) Be negative to an official pseudorabies test within thirty days of the exhibition opening date unless:
 - (a) They originate immediately and directly from a stage V area or from an area or country recognized by United States department of agriculture, animal plant health inspection service, veterinary services as pseudorabies free; or
 - (b) They originate immediately and directly from a pseudorabies qualified herd and have not been previously exhibited this show season; or
 - (c) Are exempted by a written permit issued by the department.
- (C) Swine moved within or imported into Ohio for racing shall:
 - (1) Be separated at all times from any other swine on the exhibition grounds by the greatest distance reasonably possible; and
 - (2) Be accompanied by a certificate of veterinary inspection issued within thirty days preceding the opening date of the exhibition; and
 - (3) Be negative to an official pseudorabies test within thirty days of the exhibition opening date unless:
 - (a) They originate immediately and directly from a stage V area or from an area or country recognized by United States department of agriculture, animal plant health inspection service, veterinary services as pseudorabies free; or
 - (b) They originate immediately and directly from a pseudorabies qualified herd and have not been previously exhibited this show season;

- (c) Are exempt by written permit issued by the department.
- (4) Be exempt from the immediate slaughter requirement of paragraph (A)(c) of this rule.

Cattle

- (A) Cattle moved within Ohio for exhibition:
 - (1) The animals presented for exhibition must show no symptoms or evidence of an infectious or contagious disease.
- (B) All cattle imported into Ohio for exhibition must:
 - (1) Be accompanied by a certificate of veterinary inspection issued within thirty days preceding the opening date of the exhibition;
 - (1) Originate from a tuberculosis-accredited free herd, an accredited free state or zone, or a modified accredited advanced state or zone;
 - (2) If originate from a modified accredited state or zone must comply with Rule 901:1-17-03 of the Administrative Code;
 - (3) If originate from an accreditation preparatory or a non-accredited state or zone are prohibited from exhibition;
 - (4) If from a brucellosis class A state or area/zone must be negative to an official brucellosis test within thirty days of the opening date of the exhibition unless: they are under six months of age, steers, or official vaccinates under twenty months of age (dairy) or twenty-four months of age (beef); and
 - (5) If from a brucellosis class B or C state or area/zone must meet all requirements for preentry testing as specified in 9 C.F.R. 78.9 and obtain an Ohio permit prior to movement.
- (C) Cattle from a brucellosis certified free herd or class free state or area/zone are not required to be brucellosis tested.

Goats

In order for Ohio to maintain Consistent State Status, Ohio goat exhibitions will be considered Interstate Commerce.

- (A) Goats moved within Ohio for exhibition:
 - (1) The animal presented for exhibition must show no symptoms or evidence of an infectious or contagious disease.
 - (2) All sexually intact animals and any wether eighteen months of age and older must be identified with an official identification as defined in rule 901:1-13-04 of the Ohio Administrative Code.
- (B) Goats imported into Ohio for exhibition:
 - (1) Must be accompanied by a certificate of veterinary inspection issued within thirty days preceding the opening date of the exhibition;
 - (2) The animal presented for exhibition must show no symptoms or evidence of an infectious or contagious disease; and
 - (3) The owner and the veterinarian must attest to the following statement written on the certificate of veterinary inspection "the goats in this shipment are not known to be under any movement restrictions because of scrapie."
 - (4) Originate from a tuberculosis accredited free herd as defined in rule 901-18-02 (G) of the Administrative Code for bovine tuberculosis eradication; or
 - (5) Originate from a bovine accredited free state or zone, or a bovine modified accredited advanced state or zone; or
 - (6) Originate from a bovine modified accredited state or zone must comply with Rule 901:1-17-06 of the Administrative Code.
- (C) If originate from a bovine accreditation preparatory or a bovine non-accredited state or zone are prohibited from exhibition.

Ohio goat wethers that are less than 18 months of age exhibited in Ohio do not require USDA identification.

Horses, Mules and Ponies

- (A) Horses, mules and ponies moved within Ohio for exhibition:
 - (1) If not under quarantine and if they are free of any signs of a contagious or infectious disease; and
 - (2) If the animal is twelve months of age or older, the exhibition manager may require that the animal has been tested and classed negative to an official test for equine infectious anemia within twelve months of the opening date of the exhibition.
- (B) Horses, mules and ponies imported into Ohio for exhibition:
 - (1) Shall be accompanied by an official certificate of veterinary inspection issued within thirty days of the opening date of the exhibition or obtain a permit for extended time granted by the chief of the division of animal industry as authorized in paragraph (C) of rule 901:1-17-01 of the Administrative Code; and
 - (2) If the animal is twelve months of age or older, it shall be accompanied by evidence the animal was negative to an official test for equine infectious anemia within twelve months of the opening date of the exhibition; and
 - (3) Upon request by an authorized representative of the Ohio Department of Agriculture, the person responsible for each animal must make available a chronological list of dates, places and events attended by this animal within thirty days prior to entry into Ohio.

Poultry & Fowl

- (A) All turkeys, chickens and gamebirds moved within or imported into Ohio for exhibition must:
 - (1) Originate directly from a flock or hatchery which is a participant in the national poultry improvement plan for the eradication of disease and be accompanied by documentary evidence that they meet the requirement of this paragraph; or
 - (2) Originate directly from a flock which has had a negative test for pullorum/fowl typhoid disease within twelve months preceding the opening date of exhibition and be accompanied by documentary evidence that they meet the requirement of this paragraph; or
 - (3) Have had a negative test for pullorum/fowl typhoid disease, within ninety days, preceding the opening date of the exhibition and be accompanied by documentary evidence that they meet the requirement of this paragraph; or
 - (4) Be tested for pullorum/fowl typhoid disease upon arrival at the exhibition by a tester approved by the Ohio department of agriculture and found negative.
- (B) The rapid whole blood test shall not be used to test turkeys for compliance with the requirements of paragraphs (A)(2), (A)(3) and (A)(4) of this rule.
- (C) Waterfowl, doves and pigeons are exempt from this rule.

Sheep

In order for Ohio to maintain Consistent State Status, Ohio sheep exhibitions will be considered Interstate Commerce.

- (A) Sheep moved within Ohio for exhibition:
 - (1) The animal presented for exhibition must show no symptoms or evidence of an infectious or contagious disease.
 - (2) All sexually intact animals and any wether eighteen months of age and older must be identified with an official identification as defined in rule 901:1-13-04 of the Ohio Administrative Code.
- (A) Sheep imported into Ohio for exhibition:
 - (1) Must be accompanied by a certificate of veterinary inspection issued within thirty days preceding the opening date of the exhibition; and
 - (2) The animal presented for exhibition must show no symptoms or evidence of an infectious or contagious disease; and

- (3) The owner and the veterinarian must attest to the following statement written on the certificate of veterinary inspection “the sheep in this shipment are not known to be under any movement restrictions because of scrapie.”

Rabbits

These will be inspected at fair check-in.

Dogs

All dogs over six months old must be immunized against rabies by a licensed accredited veterinarian within:

- 12 months prior to closing date of fair if a killed vaccine is used.
- 36 months prior to closing date of fair if a non-killed type of vaccine is used. All dogs must be vaccinated for parvo. The parvo vaccination must have been given after August 21 of previous year.

Dogs must meet current State Fair requirements for shots. Shot record to be required at knowledge judging.

No animals with warts, fungus, lesions (ringworm, etc.) or pinkeye will be admitted to the fairgrounds. You are reminded that all rulings on this and other health regulations are subject to the decisions of the Fair Veterinarians. The Fair Veterinarian’s decision is final.

OUTSTANDING MARKET EXHIBITOR

1. Open to all market exhibitors (beef, lamb, hog, goat, rabbit, and poultry).
2. There will be two divisions: Junior (9-14 yrs.) and Senior (15-19 yrs.) - age as of 1/1/09.
3. Top Scoring 5 Jr. and Sr. Skillathon scores will be determined prior to the fair on July 11, 2009 at Livestock Knowledge Judging day.
4. Points will be accumulated at Skillathon judging; showmanship, and market class.
5. Outstanding Market Exhibitor box must be checked on entry form or entered on-line.

JUNIOR FAIR SHOWMANSHIP CLASSES GENERAL RULES

1. Showmanship classes will be held in Dairy, Beef, Dairy Beef, Sheep, Swine, Goats, Rabbits, Poultry, Horses, and Dogs. (Horse & Dog Showmanship rules are listed elsewhere).
2. These classes will consist entirely of female animals and animals shown in market classes, with exception of poultry, rabbits, wether goats and dogs.
3. All animals shown in showmanship must be entered in a Project class.
4. Jr. Fair members exhibiting animal projects will be requested to participate in these classes according to age groups.
5. Each contestant must fit and show his/her own animal, but during the course of the contest, may be asked by the judge to show another member’s animal.
6. Showmanship is based on:
 - (A.) Appearance of the animal and equipment used to show the animal,
 - (B.) Ability to properly pose the animal,
 - (C.) Ability to move as directed by the judge,
 - (D.) Knowledge of the specie.
7. Dress shall be neat and clean, dresses and shirts must have at least 2-inch straps, not altered. No shorts, tube tops, halter tops, hats, or sunglasses. (Exception, hats permitted in horse class.)
8. It is recommended that all white clothes be worn. Colored dress (farm) shirts may be worn.

9. Age classification will be as follows:
 - (A.) Novice Showmanship – for all members 11 years and younger as of the day of the contest **and** who have not shown in that species Carroll County Junior Fair classes prior to this year’s Carroll County Fair.
 - (B.) Junior Showmanship – for all members 11 years and younger as of the day of the contest **and** have shown in that species Carroll County Junior Fair classes prior to this year’s Carroll County fair.
 - (C.) Intermediate Showmanship – for all members 12-14 years of age as of the day of the contest.
 - (D.) Senior Showmanship – for all members 15 years and over as of the day of the contest.
 - (E.) Horse showman ages are listed elsewhere.
 - (F.) Dog Showman ages are the same as Large & Small Animal.
10. A member is not eligible to compete in any showmanship classes except Showman of Showmen after they have won that class or specie. Members may compete and win in Showman of Showmen classes as often as possible. There are no “setout” periods.
11. Showmanship Awards:
 - (A.) An award will be awarded to the winner of all showmanship classes.
 - (B.) Rosettes will be awarded to the winner of each class.
 - (C.) Premiums will be as follows for all showmanship classes, except Super Showmanship.

12. **Super Showmanship will be mandatory for all Showman of Showmen contestants. Failure to participate will result in the loss of premiums and awards.**
13. All super showman of showmen participants are responsible for securing animals for other contestants to use for their respective specie during the super showman of showmen contest.

JUNIOR FAIR PREMIUMS

1. Junior Fair livestock exhibitors will be paid \$4.00 each for 1 Breeding Project animal exhibited and 1 Market Project animal exhibited in each species.
2. Non-livestock will be paid \$2.00 per project exhibited.
3. Jr. Fair members will be paid premiums for a total of four different 4-H, FFA, Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, FCCLA projects displayed. Each 4-H project is designated by a specific number. A 4-H project may consist of more than one animal, activity or exhibit, **BUT** premiums shall be paid per project, not per animal, activity, or exhibit.
4. No premium money will be awarded to Jr. Fair members unless all Jr. Fair requirements are met. No premiums will be awarded to FFA members unless the project book is currently up to date.
5. Noncompliance with any Junior Fair rule may result in forfeiture of all premiums and awards.
6. Should expenses exceed the budget, the Senior Fairboard reserves the right to prorate premiums.

BARN AWARDS

All clubs exhibiting livestock at the fair will receive barn money. Judging will be based on the condition of the club’s area, aisle, equipment, animals, attitude of the members and overall impression. All clubs exhibiting less than five (5) livestock pens/stalls at the fair will receive barn money of \$1.00 per day. Those exhibiting over five (5) pens/stalls will receive \$3.00 per day. Clubs receiving barn awards every day will be eligible for the \$50.00 drawing.

DEPARTMENT 1 – DAIRY CATTLE

- Dairy cattle with horns may not be shown in Junior Fair classes by Jr. Fair members.
- Jr. Fair projects may be combined in dairy breeder's herd class.
- Dry cows cannot be shown in milking classes.
- Exhibitors may only have one entry in each breed class (in other words, you cannot compete against yourself) except in the champion classes.
- Jr. Fair Exhibitors may do toplines on his/her own animal(s), but no artificial hair may be used.

When making entries, please denote the Breed and the Class. For example, a Holstein spring heifer calf would be entered as D-1.

2009 CARROLL COUNTY JUNIOR FAIR CHEESE PRODUCTION CONTEST RULES

1. The Junior Fair Cheese Production Contest provides Junior Fair members the opportunity to learn about cheese production and cheese yield calculations from various fluid milk production levels. It also provides the public with an opportunity to learn about cheese production.
2. All cows entered in the contest must be enrolled in an "official" (non-owner sampler) dairy testing program (DHIA or a certified official private program). All cows must be owned by the exhibitor, in partnership with a family member, or in the farm name. DHI or other official testing records will indicate ownership of livestock and will be used for the eligibility for show and sale at the Jr. Fair.
3. Any Junior Fair member enrolled in a cow project is eligible to enter the contest with any of their project cows, as long as the cow is on an official testing program, and is (or will be) entered in the Jr. Fair dairy classes and the exhibitor is enrolled in the county Cheese Production project. You may register two cows for a cheese project; both cows must have permanent ID turned in by May 15th. Only one may be submitted for the Sale.
4. All dairy breeds are eligible to participate.
5. Members must complete the entry form attached and return it to the Extension Office by May. Contact the extension office for details.
6. Cheese yields will be calculated based on 305 day records or 305 day lactation projections if the lactation is not completed.
7. A minimum of the three monthly tests must be taken for the current lactation to be evaluated for the contest. For cows without three tests, the last official lactation can be entered provided it has not been entered before, whether projected or completed.
8. Two year old cows must freshen by April 1 in order to meet the three test minimum.
9. Lactations must be current year project.
10. Cow test pages must be turned into the Extension Office by no later than July 1.
11. Cheese yields will be offered for sale first at the Large Animal Auction, Friday, July 24.
12. Members are strongly encouraged to personally contact buyers for their cheese project.
13. Awards will be offered for Grand champion Cheese Yield & Reserve Champion Cheese Yield.

DEPARTMENT 2 - BEEF CATTLE

When making entries, please denote the Breed and the Class. For example, an Angus junior heifer calf would be B-6.

10. Meat pens must be the same color combination and breed. Each rabbit must weigh 3 ½ - 5 lbs., and be no more than 12 weeks old as of the first day of the fair. If one or more rabbits do not meet requirements, entire pen is disqualified. Each exhibitor may show only one meat pen. Meat pen must come from doe owned by exhibitor.

RULES

1. The Still Project Auction is limited to those members who do not have market projects in the other Junior Fair Sales.
2. Only one item per eligible member may be sold each year. The item must be the actual one made by the member for his/her project for the current year or another item that would pertain to that project area. **All still project items to be sold at the Specialty Project Auction must be brought to and approved by the Still Project Committee representatives on the day of judging.**
3. **All items to be sold should be of quality that reflects the integrity and standards of 4-H, FFA, Boy Scouts, and Girl Scouts.**
4. To participate in the project auction, members must complete an entry form at project judging events (Project Exhibit Day, Foods, Clothing or Creative Arts Judging) as well as submit a fair entry form (found in this book).
5. Food items are to be made fresh on Tuesday, the day before, or Wednesday, the day of the sale. Food items must be double wrapped and packaged in a non-returnable container for the buyer. Paper and Styrofoam plates are permitted.
6. All garden produce should be picked fresh on sale day. It should be limited to one variety and will be sold as one unit such as a dozen ears of corn, a peck of potatoes, or a quart of strawberries.
7. There will be no sale of weapons, ammunition, refrigerated perishable food items, dairy, meat or any item deemed hazardous. **Sale committee members** will determine which project may not be appropriate for sale.
8. To be eligible to sell, Non-food items must be in place in the Junior Fair Specialty Auction Booth between 12:00 pm – 7:00 pm Monday, July 20. Food and produce items must be in the exhibit hall between 5:00-5:30 pm the day of the sale.
9. Member must be there to show their item at the sale, and are responsible for seeing that the item is on display prior to the sale. No item will be sold if the member is not present.
10. All items must be paid for at the conclusion of the sale.
11. A 2% Sale commission will go to Sale Committee.
12. All items will go to the possession of the buyer upon **purchase. The sale committee will not be held responsible for items after they are sold on Wednesday night.** All items must be packaged securely for delivery to the buyer.
13. Items selected to go the State Fair may be sold. A certificate will be given to the buyer at the auction; they will then sign and date the certificate if they feel the project is in satisfactory condition when the project is delivered to them. The exhibitor will then bring the certificate to the fair office to receive their check.

14. All participants MUST draw a number to determine sale order on the day of judging, no later than 1:00 pm OR conclusion of Project Exhibit Day. Failure to draw number will forfeit participants' eligibility to sell.
15. Proceeds of items decorating the stage sold at Specialty Project Auction will go to the 4-H Committee. **NO RESALES.**

- Horse entries will need to say “Trailer” or “Stall” on the website to indicate housing preference. Please list the horse’s name in the “Tag ID” Box.
- Unlike the paper forms, you DO NOT need to indicate the number of animals coming to the fair.

FAIR ROYALTY GUIDELINES AND RULES

ALL ENTRY FORMS **MUST** BE ACCOMPANIED BY A **RECENT PHOTO** OF THE APPLICANT.

THE PANEL OF JUDGES:

Judges will be individuals who are involved with youth in some capacity. The panel will be made up of a diverse group of individuals. When possible, there will be a mix of both male and female judges. However, this is not always possible due to the availability of judges.

CONTESTANTS:

The contest is open to Carroll County teens between 16 and 19 years of age, as of January 1st of the current year, and must be a member of one or more of the organizations represented by the Junior Fair Board: 4-H, FFA, Girl/Boy Scouts, etc.

Contestants **MUST** be available the week of the fair, as you will need to be in attendance at the major functions. The Queen, King and Court are expected to perform daily duties at the fair and **MUST** be available to complete those duties.

Each contestant and a parent must sign a commitment stating that they will fulfill their duties if selected as Royalty. If a contestant is selected and is found not to be fulfilling their commitments by the contest committee, they will be removed from the Court and forfeit all awards.

As a representative of the fair, you will be expected to **act** and **dress appropriately**, as you do when you are showing your project(s). Your banner should be worn at ALL times, unless you are showing a project & **suggested attire** includes nice summer dresses with sleeves or wide straps, skirts, skorts, capris, and slacks (khaki type are appropriate also). **Inappropriate clothing includes tee shirts, strapless or off the shoulder dresses or tops, tube tops, clothing that exposes any part of the midriff or cleavage, old or worn looking jeans or very short dresses and skirts**. Fair Royalty must behave in a manner that reflects good morals and appropriate behavior. Consuming alcohol and smoking are not permitted during any part of the fair.

If you have doubts whether or not an action or an outfit is appropriate, ask one of the advisors.
